HOW TO APPLY

We accept all **domestic** applications through the University Admission Centre (UAC) at www.uac.edu.au.

If you have completed any of these Australian qualifications, you should apply through UAC:

- an Australian Year 12 (e.g. NSW Higher School Certificate or equivalent) in or outside Australia, **or**
- an International Baccalaureate (IB) Diploma, **or**
- a New Zealand National Certificate of Educational Achievement (NCEA) Level 3, **or**
- a Diploma of Visual Arts or Certificate IV in Fine art (or equivalent).

International applications are accepted via an online Application Form: <https://nas.edu.au/apply-bfa-international-2026>.

Upon submitting your completed application to UAC or directly to NAS, and provided that you meet the eligibility requirements for admission, you will be contacted via email by NAS Student Services with an invitation to interview (See Selection Process details below).

FEES AND CHARGES

The domestic student fees for 2026 are **\$16,740 per year (full time)**. The international student fees for 2026 are **\$44,160 per year (full time)**.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

To be eligible for the BFA, applicants must have successfully completed one of the following:

- an Australian Year 12 (e.g. NSW Higher School Certificate or equivalent) in or outside Australia, **or**
- an International Baccalaureate (IB) Diploma, **or**
- a New Zealand National Certificate of Educational Achievement (NCEA) Level 3, **or**
- Diploma of Visual Arts (with the option to apply for advanced standing, see below) or TAFE CERT IV in Fine Art or equivalent **or**
- minimum of one year's tertiary study at an equivalent tertiary institution, **or**
- successful completion of the STAT test – *for applicants who are not current school leavers and do not have suitable qualifications for entry to the National Art School as outlined above.*

ADVANCED STANDING

Applicants can apply for admission into the Bachelor of Fine Art with advanced standing (also known as “credit” or “recognition of prior learning”) as acknowledgement of prior study at a university or TAFE.

Students admitted with advanced standing are given credit towards the degree for all appropriate subjects completed at another institution up to a maximum of two thirds of the total credit points required for the degree. Specified credit will be given for subjects closely related to a subject offered within the degree program.

Advanced standing is only given for study completed in the last 10 years.

The educational qualifications required for admission with advanced standing into the BFA for **second year** are:

- successful completion of the first year of a degree in fine art at an equivalent institution, or
- successful completion of a Diploma of Visual Arts at TAFE or an equivalent institution, or
- successful completion of an Advanced Diploma of Visual Arts at TAFE or an equivalent institution.

How do I apply for advanced standing?

Direct NAS applicants: If you would like to apply to the BFA with advanced standing, you will need to complete the Advanced Standing Application form at: <https://nas.edu.au/apply-advanced-standing-2026>. NAS Student Services will assess your previous study for eligibility and make the necessary arrangements. You will need to provide evidence of previous study (in English).

UAC applicants: If you would like to apply to the BFA with advanced standing, you will need to submit your initial application through UAC. Upon receiving your invitation to interview, you will then need to advise Student Services that you wish to be assessed as an Advanced Standing applicant and inform them of your preferred studio specialisation (Ceramics, Drawing, Painting, Photomedia, Printmaking, or Sculpture).

Please note: Priority for enrolment is given to National Art School continuing students and therefore entry into Second and Third Year on the basis of advanced standing is competitive and subject to availability of spaces in studio areas. All advanced standing applicants are assessed via interview and portfolio presentation by designated staff, including the relevant Head of Department where applicable.

THE SELECTION PROCESS

Admission into the Bachelor of Fine Art is competitive, with selection based on the applicant’s **portfolio, interview, and personal statement**. All eligible applicants will be invited to an interview. Note: Selection is not based on ATAR.

Upon submitting your completed application to UAC or directly to NAS, and provided that you meet the eligibility requirements for admission, you will be contacted via email by NAS Student Services indicating the time and date of your interview. Whilst in-person interviews are preferred, there are options to undertake an interview online, particularly for those applicants living overseas or interstate.

The interview panel will consist of academic staff from the National Art School. The panel will ask you a range of questions relating to your interest in the arts, your portfolio, observational drawing and your reasons for wishing to study at the National Art School. There will also be an opportunity for you to ask course-related questions of the panel.

BFA Application Materials

The application materials should consist of:

- **Personal Statement** (500-1000 words)
- **Portfolio**, consisting of a minimum of 12 recently completed works, including at least two drawings

- **Relevant support materials** such as drawings, maquettes, sketchbooks and visual diaries
- **Evidence of Meeting English Proficiency** (if applicable)

Portfolio

A minimum of 12 recently completed artworks, including at least two drawings. Guidance can be found at <https://nas.edu.au/bfa-portfolio>

All applicants will be required to submit their portfolio electronically. Your portfolio should be submitted in PowerPoint, or PDF format only and must be readable by both Mac and PC.

Personal Statement

The admissions panel will read your written personal statement prior to your interview. The personal statement must address the following points:

- Why you are interested in studying at the National Art School
- What you hope to achieve from your study at the National Art School
- Exhibitions have you seen or participated in during the last 12 months
- Other cultural interests do you have, e.g., films, theatre, music, literature
- An outline of your current art interests

The statement must be written by you and should be clearly written, with specific examples. It should demonstrate English language competence and good written communication skills. It must be typed and 500-1000 words in length and submitted in either a Word Document or PDF format.

Evidence of meeting the English Proficiency requirement (if applicable)

Applicants who **do not** have an assessable qualification undertaken and assessed in English, are required to provide evidence of meeting English Proficiency and supply English test scores with your application (see approved test scores below).

UAC applicants must submit evidence directly to UAC upon application.

INTERNATIONAL APPLICANTS

You are considered to be an international student if you are **NOT**:

- an Australian citizen, or
- a New Zealand citizen, or
- a dual citizen of any country with Australia or New Zealand, or
- a permanent resident of Australia.

If you meet any of these criteria, you are considered a domestic student.

You are an international student if you hold a permit for temporary entry to Australia. This includes if you are an overseas student, a permanent resident of New Zealand, a diplomat, a temporary resident holding a work permit, a refugee, or a dependent of any of the above.

To study in Australia, you'll need to apply for both admission to an institution and also for a student visa from the Australian Government.

There are a number of steps you must go through including:

- Deciding on your preferred course and institution
- Submitting your application to the institution
- Receiving and accepting a Letter of Offer
- Receiving your electronic Confirmation of Enrolment (eCoE)
- Applying for your student visa

Education agents in your home country can also help you with applying to study in Australia.

There are several classes of student visas for Australia - the one you need depends on the type of study (eg: English language course, graduate degree, vocational training, higher education, etc.) you are planning to undertake.

Student visa options

There are various visas that you can apply for to study in Australia which depend on the type of study you choose to undertake. If you would like to study in Australia at a university or tertiary level, then you may be eligible for the Student Visa (subclass 500).

Evidence of meeting the English Proficiency requirements

All programs at NAS are taught in English. Applicants who are applying on the basis of qualifications that were not undertaken and assessed in English must provide evidence of their English language proficiency.

Applicants who have completed one of the following criteria may satisfy the English language requirement:

- tertiary qualification in Australia completed within the last 2 years
- tertiary studies in a country where studies were conducted in English within the last 2 years, confirmed with a statement or certificate from the Registrar's office (subject also to independent assessment)
- Australian matriculation score C or better (Pre-University Program such as AUSMAT)
- TAFE AQF Certificate IV in English for Academic Purposes, AQF Diploma or Advanced Diploma

NAS recognises several English Language tests and English Preparation Courses which can be undertaken to meet the English language requirements for admission. These are set out in the table below, together with the minimum results required. Test scores are not valid if the test was taken more than two years prior to the date of application.

International applicants are required to submit their test scores with their application or as soon as available. An offer of admission may be made pending the receipt of an English Test result if all other entry requirements have been satisfied.

If you are applying direct to NAS, you will need to supply English test scores with your application (see approved test scores below). **UAC applicants must submit evidence directly to UAC upon application.**

Cambridge Certificate in Advanced English (CAE) – prior to 2015	Pass with a C Grade (60+/100)
Cambridge English Scale (CPE) – from 2015	Overall min. scale score of 180 (min.180 in each subtest)
Cambridge English Scale (CAE) – from 2015	Overall min. scale score of 176 (min.169 in each subtest)
PTE Academic (Pearson)	Minimum score of between 51-60

OFFERS

To accept an offer, applicants must complete online acceptance with UAC by the deadline specified in their offer notification. These can be accessed from your profile on the UAC website (www.uac.edu.au). You will need to follow the online instructions. Ensure you have your UAC application and UAC PIN ready.

Offers for domestic applicants will be released as per your Interview Round.

International applicants will normally be informed of the result of their application via email in early January.
